#### ABOUT OTTERS

The Eurasian otter is found throughout Europe and Asia. Their numbers have been declining since the 1960s. In Ireland, however, their numbers have remained relatively steady. Because if this, Ireland is known as the stronghold for the Eurasian otter. Otters can be found all around Ireland.

Otters live in holts or couches along waterways. They can live in places such as rivers, lakes, streams, and even coastal areas. Otters living in coastal areas such as Youghal must also have access to a freshwater system in order to be able to clean their fur.

Otters are top predators. They hunt animals such as fish (in particular salmon and trout), and even small frogs and birds. They use their whiskers to sense the vibrations and movement of prey in the water to help them hunt.

Otters are a protected species in Ireland, meaning that it is illegal to hunt or intentionally harm them. However, they still face many threats such as habitat loss, pollution and even traffic. As otters are a keystone species, it is so important to protect and conserve otters by raising awareness about them.

One such way to educate and raise awareness is World Otter Day is May 26th, celebrated globally by otter lovers all over the world. It was founded by the International Otter Survival Fund to raise awareness of the dangers that otters face in an increasingly urbanized world.



### OLLIE THE OTTER

Ollie the Otter was a favourite local to see around town. He had been frequently spotted walking through town in 2020, a very charismatic and active presence in the area.

The loss of this delightful otter was felt throughout this town, and reminded us of the need to take care of the wildlife in our urban spaces.



This bank is an excellent habitat for otters, as well as many bird species, and has beautiful views of the estuary.


It is a great place for otter watching, particularly at dawn and dusk.
